Varlaxudden

## What to know before you go to

### **Finland**

#### What to Expect

Finland is known for its design, technology, and a deep connection with nature. The country is also famous for its sauna culture, which is a must-try experience. Finnish cuisine is based on fresh, local ingredients. Popular dishes include rye bread, salmon, reindeer meat, and Karelian pies (Karjalanpiirakka). Don't miss trying the traditional Finnish coffee and cinnamon rolls (korvapuusti).

#### Language

Finnish and Swedish are the two official languages of Finland. Finnish is the most widely spoken, while Swedish is spoken mainly along the southwestern coast and the Åland Islands. English is widely spoken, particularly in urban areas and among younger people, making it easy for travelers to communicate.

#### **Currency**

The official currency of Finland is the Euro (€). Credit and debit cards are widely accepted throughout the country, including in most rural areas. ATMs are also readily available, but it's advisable to carry some cash, especially in remote locations or for small purchases.

#### **Time Zone**

Finland operates on Eastern European Time (EET), which is UTC+2. During Daylight Saving Time, from the last Sunday in March to the last Sunday in October, the clocks move forward one hour to Eastern European Summer Time (EEST), or UTC+3.



#### **Plug Adaptor**

Finland uses Type C and F electrical outlets, with a standard voltage of 230V and a frequency of 50Hz. If your devices use a different plug type, you will need a plug adaptor.

#### **Airport Locations**

Helsinki Vantaa International Airport (HEL):

The main international airport, located about 17 km north of Helsinki, serving as a hub for flights throughout Finland and Europe.

Rovaniemi International Airport (RVN):

Located near the Arctic Circle, serving as a gateway to Lapland, particularly popular in winter for those visiting Santa Claus Village.

Tampere-Pirkkala Airport (TMP):

Located 17 km southwest of Tampere, offering both domestic and international flights.

Turku Airport (TKU):

Situated 8 km north of Turku, providing flights to various European destinations.

Oulu Airport (OUL):

Finland's second-busiest airport, located 15 km south of Oulu, serving northern Finland.



## Knowing the driving rules in **Finland**

Finland's roads are well-kept, maintained, and clearly signposted, so driving in Finland is relatively straightforward. Keeping daytime running lights on at all (also in the Summer) is mandatory, so before you set off you should check whether the car has them automatically on or if they need to be switched on manually before driving. If you're travelling in winter, you should pay extra attention as icy conditions can make the road more dangerous. Seatbelts are mandatory for all passengers and using your mobile phone when driving is prohibited. Like many of their European neighbours, Finns drive on the right-hand side of the road.

Here's our top tips for driving in Finland in winter:

- Check the weather forecast and warnings before driving.
- Winter tyres are mandatory in Finland during winter.
- Keep a snow brush and ice scraper in your car and keep your car hood, roof, lights, and windows snow-free. Failing to do so will incur in a fine.
- During winter, it's essential to pack warm clothes in the car, as the weather can be extremely cold.
- Stay on main roads to avoid unsalted or unploughed road conditions.
- Animal crossings are frequent, so watch out for warning signs.
